**DATE OF MEETING:** February 13, 2020

AGENDA ITEM: Osawatomie Pound Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR) Program Presentation

**PRESENTER:** Always & Furever Midwest Animal Sanctuary

**ISSUE SUMMARY:** At the January 23rd council meeting, a work session was held to discuss the potential for a trap-neuter-return program at the Osawatomie Municipal Pound at the request of Always & Furever Midwest Animal Sanctuary. Always & Furever would like to give Council more information on the program.

Attached you'll find an informational packet provided by Always & Furever regarding TNR programs.

Also included is a Memorandum of Understanding for the Council to consider.

COUNCIL ACTION NEEDED: Review and discuss. Provide direction to staff.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION TO COUNCIL: Review the information and provide any feedback to staff.



Who We Are. Always & Furever is a 501(c)3 non-profit in Spring Hill, KS dedicated to saving the lives of the unwanted, forgotten, and abandoned dogs and cats.

What are we asking? We are asking the City of Osawatomie to approve an ordinance change to allow Always & Furever to implement a Trap-Neuter-Return Program or TNR for short.

What is TNR? TNR is the humane approach to controlling feral cat overpopulation. It's a community-based program that we are proposing for Osawatomie to change its ordinance to allow concerned citizens to trap free-roaming cats, bring them to a clinic to get them spayed or neutered, and then return the cats to the exact location where they are trapped so they can live out the rest of their natural lives. There is a large population of homeless stray and feral cats. Given their strong survival capabilities and prolific breeding, if nothing is done, this population will simply continue to grow. If the population is left unchecked, it will only lead to more and more cats living in unmanaged colonies, a decrease in public tolerance of homeless cats, and increased pressure on the environment, animal control agencies and our society as a whole. Currently the cats that are taking in by the police or animal control are brought to the pound and when the pound is full they are euthanized.

What is the Current Program? The current approach to controlling/capturing feral cats and turning them in to the pound where they will be killed, may temporarily reduce their numbers, but this doesn't solve the problem. Trap and Remove (and Euthanize) doesn't work. Cats are living there in the environment because of two main reasons: 1) there is a food source (intended or not) and 2) there is some sort of shelter. When cats are removed from a location, it creates a "vacuum" effect — meaning the surrounding cats can sense it and they breed rapidly to fill in the gap, plus new cats move in to take advantage of the natural food and shelter sources. This vacuum effect is well documented. Trapping and removing cats often results in having even more unsterilized cats in the location than when you started. Catch and kill is very costly, doesn't work, and ultimately it's inhumane.

**Do you REALLY have a cat problem?** While you may not see them at your house, think about the reproduction rate of unaltered felines. Math experts calculate that one female cat and her offspring will produce 100 cats in seven years, assuming that all adult cats remain alive for all seven years. The average number of litters a fertile cat produces is 1 to 2 a year with the average litter being from 4 to 6 kittens.

Note: These numbers do NOT reflect the cat population in Osawatomie. This solely notes the number of cats the police brought in. Imagine the numbers of the cats left outside unaltered. This is merely to show an example of their reproduction rate if trapped and released without altering.

What are we proposing and why? Trap-Neuter-Return is a proven and humane solution! TNR programs succeed in this case at <u>NO COST</u> to the city because Always & Furever will fund the vetting and trapping as well as do all of the work and provides the best possible life for the cats themselves. Always & Furever will devote all of its resources – financial, personnel and material – toward decreasing the number of homeless cats in your community by paying for the sterilization services for feral cats. Cat colonies can quickly quadruple in size in a very short period of time, as cats can have two to three litters per year of five to six kittens each. And then those kittens can become pregnant at about six months of age...and so the cycle continues. Spaying and neutering the cats will not only stop the breeding cycle, but it will also eliminate problematic behaviors such as howling, fighting and spraying.

#### TNR is effective because:

- Halt reproduction of existing cats through sterilization, leading to long-term management, reduction and eventual elimination of outdoor cat populations
- Vaccinate cats against rabies (and other diseases, depending on available resources), addressing public health and safety risks
- Decrease nuisance complaints by eliminating or dramatically reducing noise from cat fighting and mating and odor from unneutered male cats spraying urine to mark their territory
- Ease the burden on community resources such as the pound being flooded with cats and their offspring
- Bring new volunteer workforces into the community
- May in some instances create an immediate reduction in cats due to: Kittens young enough to be socialized can be routed into adoption channels, depending on available shelter or rescue resources
  - o Friendly adult cats being evaluated for potential reunification with lost owners, transition into home of caretakers, or rehoming through rescue and shelter channels depending on situation and resources and the input of caretakers and feeders bonded with the cats
    - Both of these options are recommended and we would work to implement only if a live outcome for the cats is likely. If that is not the case we recommend sterilization, vaccination, and return to territory for all cats.
- Can improve community and neighborhood relations and lead to new collaborations
- Maintain the health of colony cats (cats living together in a given territory) and allow caretakers to trap new cats who join the colony for TNR or other live-outcome options



#### Is there any Potential Liability to Osawatomie?

A municipality would be liable for an injury or damage only if it committed an act of negligence. Implementing or permitting a TNR program to reduce the community cat population and resolve nuisance complaints is reasonable government behavior, not negligent conduct. In addition, liability for harm caused by animals typically stems from ownership— but no one "owns" a community cat just as no one "owns" a squirrel who might cause damage. Even if a person is bitten or scratched, a TNRed cat likely would have been vaccinated against rabies. Rabies prophylaxis treatment will likely still be advisable, but the real risk of rabies is reduced. Consider an alternate situation, where a person is bitten and sues the municipality because officials turned down a TNR program that would have dealt with an overpopulation issue and vaccinated cats against the disease. At least 34 states require rabies vaccination for cats, and efforts should be made to revaccinate cats when possible<sup>2</sup>.

Conclusion... do all lives really matter? Osawatomie has a choice, to work to manage the cat population that is already there or ignore it. Well-designed and well-implemented programs that focus on non-lethal control and involve all community stakeholders are in line with public opinion. Always & Furever is committed to mobilize an army of compassionate, dedicated people who care about the cats, wildlife, and their communities; however, we can only do this by working with the city to allow the trapping and return and implementation of the program. The implementation and logistics of how the program will work will rely heavily upon proven success at Prairie Paws and other programs. Doing nothing will result in not only the continued increase in the cat population but also the increase in deaths of feral cats.

#### **RECORD OF SUCCESS:**

- An 85% reduction in population over 11 years. Before implementing a TNR program on the University of Central Florida campus, periodic trap and removal efforts tried to keep the population at bay when it increased to nuisance levels. This 11-year study followed a population of 155 free-roaming campus cats from 1991, when the TNR program began, to 2002. No kittens were observed on site after 1995. Additional stray or abandoned cats arrived, but they were neutered and adopted before they could reproduce. The campus cat population decreased by 85% to 23 cats in 2002, demonstrating that a long-term program of neutering plus adoption or a return to the resident colony can reduce free-roaming cat populations in urban areas<sup>3</sup>.
- A city-wide TNR program decreased colony sizes in Rome, Italy by 21%, despite cat immigration (abandonment and spontaneous arrival)<sup>4</sup>
- After implementing TNR at The Fairfax County Animal Shelter in Virginia, the shelter noted a significant decrease in the number of feline offspring entering the shelter's foster care program. The shelter saw a 58% decrease in the number of feral offspring in the shelter's foster care program in 2011 versus in 2010. In addition, foster data from 2008 through 2011 showed a 41% decrease in the number of bottle-fed kittens entering the shelter and a 9% decrease in the total number of kittens needing foster care when comparing 2010 to 2011<sup>5</sup>.
- Arlington, Texas had a 48% decrease in cat intake at the Arlington Animal Shelter after implementing a TNR program<sup>6</sup>
- In Alachua County, Florida a TNR program led to a 70% decline in animal control cat intake in the targeted area and a 13% decline in other areas. Further, per capita shelter intake was 3.5 times higher and per capita shelter euthanasia was 17.5 times higher in the non-target area compared to the TNR target area<sup>7</sup>
- A TNR and spay/neuter voucher program resulted in a 50% increase in animals saved and a 50% decline in animals euthanized in Aiken County, South Carolina<sup>8</sup>.
- In an 8 year period of implementing TNR, San Jose county shelter reduced its cat euthanasia rate from 66.6% down to 34.9%<sup>9</sup>
- TNR proms are cost-effective. For many years, Texas A&M University attempted to control its campus cat population with a trap and- euthanize approach. Two years after a trap test-

vaccinate-alter-return-monitor (TTVARM) program was implemented on campus, there was a 36% reduction in the number of cats and fewer nuisance complaints to the university's pest control service. The authors also note that although the initial costs of starting up TTVARM programs can be substantial in terms of time and money, these costs tend to decrease with time as fewer new cats need to be caught<sup>10</sup>.

- Trap-and-remove efforts can have the opposite effect To determine the population impact of trap and remove (culling) efforts on two open population sites in Tasmania, researchers used wildlife cameras and cat counts to track the number of cats at each site. Despite culling efforts, researchers found large increases in cat numbers: one site had a 75% increase, while another had a staggering 211% increase. Researchers suspect that the populations increased because new cats moved into the sites to take advantage of resources that became available when previously dominant cats were removed. Another explanation could be that kittens born to the unsterilized remaining cats had a better survival rate thanks to more readily available resources (Lazenby et al., 2014)<sup>11</sup>.
- Neutered free-roaming males exhibit less aggression This study compared four free-roaming cat
  colonies in urban Israel: two that were managed by TNR and two that were not managed at all.
  Less aggression was observed in the neutered groups, specifically between males, which resulted
  in reduced fighting and vocalizations. The study concludes that TNR reduced the noise
  associated with mating and fighting and could lead to fewer nuisance complaints<sup>12</sup>.
- Reduced nuisance behaviors in reality and perception Researchers at a federal facility and hospital in Louisiana studied 41 cats in a TNR program. Three years later, 30 of the original cats remained. Their overall health had improved and nighttime vocalizations were greatly reduced, and no new litters of kittens were found. Although cats were seen as a nuisance prior to the program, human attitudes changed by the end of the three-year period<sup>13</sup>.
- Dramatically reduced shelter intake, impound and euthanasia numbers This study examined the impact of a municipal shelter's Return to Field program in San Jose, California. These programs are shelter-based and include sterilizing, vaccinating, ear tipping and returning healthy, impounded community cats to the place they were found, with or without an identified caregiver. Over four years, the shelter's program garnered decreases in cat intakes (from 70% to 23%), cat and kitten impounds (by 29.1%) and euthanasia for Upper Respiratory Disease (by 99%)<sup>14</sup>.
- Including vaccinations in TNR programs can protect feral cats for many years A TNR program for feral cats in Florida included vaccinations at the time of sterilization. Researchers were able to compare a cat's antibody titers (a measurement that indicates the strength of the body's immune response to a given disease) before the vaccinations and then 10 weeks postvaccination. Many cats had an excellent immune response, indicated by the increase in protective antibody

titers post-vaccination: panleukopenia (90%), herpes (56%), calicivirus (93%) and rabies (98%). Other studies have shown that postvaccination immunity persists for a minimum of three to seven years in most cats, which means that many feral cats are protected for much of their remaining lifespan. The authors conclude that TNR programs that include vaccinations are likely to protect individual cats and possibly reduce diseases in feral cats in general (Fischer et al., 2007)<sup>15</sup>.

- Unowned free-roaming cats don't have higher FeLV infection rates than owned cats In this study, 1,876 unowned free-roaming cats who were treated in TNR programs in North Carolina and Florida were tested for FeLV infection and FIV antibodies. The results indicate that the prevalence of FeLV infection and FIV antibodies in unowned free-roaming cats are similar to infection rates reported for owned cats<sup>16</sup>.
- The secondary effects of neutering can improve community cat welfare Body condition scores can help evaluate a cat's overall healthy and welfare. This study analyzed the body condition of 105 adult feral cats at the time of neutering and found that they were lean (but not emaciated). Fourteen of the original cats were trapped one year later and showed significant increases in weight and improvements in body condition similar to those of confined pet cats. Caretakers also noted that neutered cats roamed less. The researchers conclude that in addition to halting reproduction, neutering may have other effects that improve the welfare of community cats (Scott et al., 2002)<sup>17</sup>.
- Despite popular belief, toxoplasmosis is not definitively associated with exposure to cats According to the authors, the transmission of toxoplasmosis from cats to people rarely occurs from direct contact. They state that people most commonly acquire toxoplasmosis by eating the cyst form of toxoplasmosis in undercooked meat. A case study of toxoplasmosis in pregnant women did not show a significant association with having an adult cat or kitten at home, cleaning the litter box or having a cat who actively hunts. The authors also cite a study of HIV-infected adults that did not show any association of toxoplasmosis with cat ownership or exposure <sup>18</sup>.

There are millions of homeless cats in the United States. Addressing this crisis can be overwhelming, and is a difficult and emotional issue for many people. Some groups and individuals advocate so-called "trap, neuter, release" programs, in which cats (who are often quite tame, as opposed to being truly feral or unsocialized) are sterilized and then abandoned outdoors instead of being admitted to animal shelters. But PETA's experiences—which include countless incidents in which cats experienced prolonged suffering and died in agony because they were forced to fend for themselves outdoors, whether "managed" or not—have led us to question whether these programs are truly in the cats' best interests.

Homeless cats <u>do not die of old age</u>. Highly contagious diseases are common, as are infected puncture wounds, broken bones, urinary tract infections, internal injuries, attacks by other animals or cruel humans, automobile accidents, and weather extremes or other terrible living conditions, having to scrounge for food, and being considered a "nuisance," through no fault of their own. Moreover, free-roaming cats—no matter how well-fed they are—terrorize and kill <u>billions of birds and small native mammals in the U.S. every year</u>, animals who are not equipped to deal with these non-native predators.

Having witnessed firsthand the many gruesome fates of homeless cats and of the animals they prey upon, PETA believes the ideal solution lies in preventing cat homelessness in the first place, by passing and enforcing strong responsible guardianship laws, including requirements that cats (and dogs!) be spayed and neutered, licensed and microchipped, and kept indoors or safely contained on their guardian's property. Homeless cats need—and deserve—to be brought indoors or taken to open-admission animal shelters where they are safe and warm, and have a chance at being adopted into loving homes.

Each situation is different, but it's never acceptable to feed cats without providing them with medical care, vaccinations, and sterilization surgeries **at the minimum**. Feeding alone only serves to keep cats in a dangerous situation while also perpetuating the overpopulation crisis and its tragic consequences: the needless suffering and premature deaths of millions of animals every year.

If you've determined that you have the time and resources to properly care for a colony of unsocialized (feral) cats, and if the cats are in a safe place (i.e., the climate is temperate and they can be safely contained in a securely enclosed area), please be sure to follow the following minimum guidelines.

### Caring for a Feral Cat Colony

The responsibilities of a feral cat caregiver include ensuring that all cats are safely contained on a property where they are welcome, preferably your own. Before caring for cats on someone else's property, it's important

to get written permission to do so, and have a plan in place for what to do if the property is sold to someone who doesn't want the cats there or the property owner has a change of heart.

All cats must be <u>humanely captured</u>, sterilized, thoroughly <u>vaccinated</u>, provided with fresh water and food in a sanitary feeding station, given access to shelter, provided with litterboxes (one per cat) that are cleaned twice per day, and treated for illnesses and injuries. A properly managed feral cat colony doesn't exceed the number of animals legally allowed at any one residence in the jurisdiction in which it is located, is no larger than the caregiver(s) can care for, and is healthy and stable, i.e., no new kittens are born. Only truly feral cats should be added to colonies—tame cats should be cared for indoors, rehomed, or taken to shelters where they have a chance at being reunited with their guardians or adopted into loving indoor-only homes.

#### Health

Find a veterinarian who can be somewhat flexible—feral cats don't always keep their appointments! Consider the costs of each new cat's needs: spaying/neutering, a full exam, ear and dental cleaning, deworming, feline leukemia and feline AIDS testing, and vaccinations, and the ongoing costs of regular veterinary check-ups, dentals, vaccinations, deworming, and monthly oral flea control (make sure to use only medicines that clearly state that they are for oral administration), and more.

Cats who test positive for leukemia (FeLV) or AIDS (FIV) must be isolated from non-positive cats, or euthanized to prevent them from infecting others. If you decide to keep them in isolation, keep in mind that they require close monitoring and considerable financial resources: These infections can cause a progressive deterioration in a cat's health. Painful symptoms often include loss of appetite, progressive weight loss, persistent fever, gum and mouth infections, bladder, skin, and upper respiratory infections, persistent diarrhea, seizures and other neurological disorders, and variety of eye conditions. A study found that nearly a quarter of feral cats in one community were positive for one or both of these deadly infections.

Plan your budget depending on the age, health, and number of cats in the colony. Make sure that you can cover daily and routine expenses in addition to unexpected costs for taking care of injuries and illnesses. Local animal shelters and spay/neuter clinics may be able to help with low-cost surgeries and box trap rentals.

If you notice any cats whose behavior or eating habits have changed, who are lethargic, or who have dull eyes, a dull and/or matted coat, or discharge from the nose or eyes—all possible indicators of ill health—retrap them and take them to your vet. It may help to work out a plan in advance so that your vet can provide you with medications for minor health problems.

Stay organized! Maintain veterinary records on and take a photo of each cat, keep track of any problems that they have had, and maintain a list of those who still require sterilization. Ear-tipping (the removal of a quarter-inch off the top of the left ear conducted by a veterinarian during sterilization surgery) will enable you to identify those who have been sterilized. All cats should be microchipped to ensure proper identification in the event of a health crisis or other emergency.

With unsocialized domestic animals depending on you for their every need and safety, it's critical that you have a plan in place for ensuring the cats' safety in the event of a <u>natural disaster</u>, or in case something happens to you, the person they depend on. This is another reason why keeping all cats in an enclosed area is so important.

# MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

THIS MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING ("MOU") is made and
osawatomie, Kansas, a municipal corporation under the laws of the State of Kansas, (hereinafter referred to as the "City") and the Always & Furever Animal Sanctuary, a local agency that operates and maintains an animal care facility (hereinafter referred to as "Always & Furever"). The City and Always & Furever may, from time to time herein, be collectively referred to as "the parties."
WHEREAS, on, 2020, the Governing Body of the City of Osawatomie, Kansas entered into an MOU pertaining to the regulation of animals, which excludes community—or feral—cats from the City Code provisions regarding running at large and ownership;
<b>WHEREAS,</b> a community cat is unsocialized to humans and has a temperament of extreme fear or resistance to contact with humans and has a straight line cutting of the tip of the ear to indicate it has been sterilized;
<b>WHEREAS</b> , trap-neuter-release (TNR) is a program that seeks to address community cats that roam around the city. The goal of the program is to trap a colony of cats, spay/neuter and vaccinate them, and return them to where they were collected. It is believed that over time this will reduce the number of feral cats; and
WHEREAS, MOU indirectly allows for a TNR program within the city, and shall take effect, 2020. The parties acknowledge a need for a mutual understanding regarding the duties of each once the MOU's provision regarding community cats takes effect.
NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties agree as follows:
1. Responsibilities of Always & Furever.
a. No later than, 2020, Always & Furever will design brochures, door hangers, and other materials providing sufficient information regarding the provisions of MOU that relate to community cats, as well information on programs and resources that interested parties may benefit from.
b. Such educational materials will be updated by Always & Furever periodically and as needed.

- c. Educational materials developed and designed by Always & Furever shall be forwarded electronically to City within a reasonable timeframe upon their completion.
- d. Always & Furever will keep educational materials at its location and is authorized to distribute such materials to the community.
- e. If a community cat(s) is disrupting a neighborhood within the city, as evidenced by call volume for a particular cat(s) or individuals providing specific information about the alleged disruption, Always & Furever will lend traps to residents to get the cat(s). The City is not responsible for any TNR trapping, vaccinations, surgery-related, or returning expenses.

### 2. Responsibilities of City.

- a. Educational materials provided by Always & Furever will be printed by City in a format determined by the City. The costs of printing shall be reasonable and subject to approval by the City.
- b. The City's Designated Staff shall act as the primary distributor of such materials to complainants, appropriate neighborhood contacts, and any other person or entity the City deems appropriate.
- c. When the City's Designated Staff encounters a community cat that is not ear-tipped, whether encountered in the field or by complaint, the Designated Staff Member will attempt to locate the food source or, if known, resident who is feeding the cat(s). If the food source is a resident, Designated Staff will attempt to make contact. Designated Staff Members will utilize their training and experience to confirm that the cat(s) are indeed community cats.
- d. Residents feeding, acting as caretakers for, or harboring confirmed community cats that are not vaccinated, altered, and ear-tipped may be given a Notice to Correct the violation (e.g. over the limit, unvaccinated, nuisance, at-large) and shall be provided with a brochure that contains a list of nonprofit organizations that offer low cost TNR services.
- e. The City and its Designated Staff will endeavor to send Always & Furever details surrounding complaints or general reports of community cats that are responded to in the field. Details will include field contact or complainant name and contact information, address or cross street

location of the cat(s), and specific complaint regarding the cat(s). Always & Furever will use its best efforts to resolve the complaint but is not obligated to resolve it or impound the cat(s).

- 3. **Training.** The parties agree to collaborate to provide education and training opportunities of interest to the parties. Specific education and training opportunities will be separately agreed to by the parties, and may include the following:
  - a. The parties agree to share information about education and training opportunities that may be of interest to the other party and to share information from training sessions of mutual interest.
- 4. **Quarterly Meetings.** The parties agree to meet quarterly at agreed upon times, or as otherwise agreed to by the parties, to discuss matters relating to this MOU, including:
  - a. Critically evaluating and discussing the effectiveness of the cooperation of the parties pursuant to this MOU and identify areas for improvement;
  - b. Reviewing and confirming the accuracy of the information contained on the educational materials developed by Always & Furever and printed by the City pursuant to this MOU; and
  - c. Discussing any other matters of importance to the parties.
- 5. **Termination.** Either party to the MOU may terminate it upon 30 days' prior written notice without necessity of demonstrating cause; provided, however, that either party may terminate this MOU immediately upon written notice to the other party in the event that such action is necessary for significant health or safety issues or to comply with applicable law.
- 6. **Modification.** This MOU may be modified only in a writing signed by both parties. The parties shall endeavor to examine this MOU biennially, to ensure compatibility and effectiveness with any changes in laws, policies, or circumstances.
- 7. **Severability.** If any provision of this MOU is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be illegal or unenforceable, the remaining provisions of this MOU shall not be affected and shall be read as if the MOU did not contain the

particular provision held to be invalid, unless to do so would contravene the present valid and legal intent of the parties.

- 8. **No Third-Party Beneficiary.** This MOU is not intended to benefit any third party, nor shall any person who is not now or in the future a party hereto be entitled to enforce any of the rights or obligations of a party under this MOU.
- 9. **Applicable Law.** This MOU shall be governed and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of Kansas.

# EXCERPT OF BYLAWS OF KANSAS MUNICPAL ENERGY AGENCY ARTICLE V BOARD OF DIRECTORS

**Section 5.1. Selection of Directors**. The property and business of the Agency shall be managed by the Board of Directors of the Agency. The Board of Directors shall consist of two (2) Directors for each Member, provided that there shall be not less than seven (7) Directors. The Directors shall be selected by the governing bodies of the Members. In the event that the number of Members is less than seven (7), each Member shall be represented by the number of Directors which would constitute a Board of Directors of not less than seven (7) Members, provided that each Member shall select the same number of Directors. Each Member must designate the two (2) Directors as "Director-1" and "Director-2".

The term of each Director shall be for a period of two (2) years except that the initial term of a number equal to one half of the Directors, comprised of those individuals designated as Director-2, shall be selected to a term of one (1) year. Any Director selected by a Member may be removed at any time by the Member selecting the Director. Each Director so selected shall (a) reside within the territory served by the electric utility of the selecting Member; or (b) be an employee of the selecting Member. Each Director shall meet all other requirements of the Act and the Agreement. Any such selection (other than a replacement selection) shall occur prior to the annual meeting of the Agency. Written evidence of selection shall be forwarded by the City Clerk or other authorized official of the Member to the Agency in writing prior to the annual meeting. Each Director shall continue in office until a successor is selected in accordance with this *Article V*.

**Section 5.2. Voting Powers**. Each Member shall be entitled to one Director vote on the Board of Directors which shall be equal to the vote of every other Member. Such vote shall be cast on behalf of the Member by Director-1 of such Member, if present; if such Director-1 is not present then by Director-2. Other than actions required in **Article XII** hereof, all actions of the Board of Directors shall be made upon affirmative vote of a majority of the Directors entitled to vote and voting on such action.

**Section 5.3. Compensation**. Except as may be specifically authorized by the Board of Directors, no Director shall receive payment from the Agency for any time spent in attending meetings of the Board of Directors or otherwise conducting business of the Agency. To the extent that funds are available, the Board of Directors, the Executive Committee, or the General Manager may authorize payment of expenses for travel in connection with the business of the Agency for other than meetings of the Board of Directors pursuant to the Act.

**Section 5.4. Vacancies**. In the event of a vacancy on the Board of Directors the appropriate Member shall select an individual to fill such vacancy for the remainder of the term in accordance with the same procedure as set forth for the selection of the initial Director. Written evidence of selection shall be provided to the Agency before voting privileges will take effect.

**Section 5.5. Removal or Resignation**. A Director may be removed only by the governing body of the Member selecting such Director. Any Director may resign by providing notice to the governing body of the Member the Director represents. The governing body shall certify to the Agency such removal or resignation of a Director.

**Section 5.6. Successor Director.** Upon removal or resignation of a Director, a successor Director will be selected by the governing body in the same manner as the original Director was selected, and the successor Director will be certified by the governing body to the Agency in the same manner as the original Director was certified. The successor Director shall serve for the remainder of the unexpired term of the original Director, subject to the rights of the governing body and such successor Director under **Section 5.5** of these Bylaws.

**Section 5.7. Alternates.** Each Member shall designate an Alternate or Alternates for the Director in the same manner as the Directors are designated. In the event any Director is unable to attend a meeting, any duly appointed Alternate may substitute at the meeting of the Board of Directors for such Director. The Member shall provide the Agency with written notification of the selection of such Alternate or Alternates. In the event neither Director designated by the Member is present, the Alternate may vote on behalf of such Member unless the governing body of the Member has specifically prohibited the Alternate from voting on the Member's behalf. If more than one Alternate is designated by the Member, the governing body shall specify in its designation the order in which the Alternates shall have voting rights on behalf of the Member.

AGENDA ITEM: Proposed Condemnations

**PRESENTER:** Ed Beaudry, Building Inspector

**ISSUE SUMMARY:** The City staff has identified six properties for the City Council to consider for condemnations. The report on each property is included and photos will be shown at the meeting to demonstrate the problems with each property. Once it is determined which properties should be provided notice, the City Council must pass a resolution which will set the time and place for a hearing on the proposed condemnations.

In the packet we have included inspection reports for each of the following proposed properties.

315 Walnut Avenue

815 Pacific Avenue

837 Chestnut Avenue

905 9th Street

905 Chestnut Avenue

Following is a summary of the procedure for when a non-emergency condemnation occurs.

#### **Procedure for Condemnations**

- 1. First step is to have the enforcing officer file a written statement that is presented to the governing body that describes the property, where the property is located and that the property is unsafe or dangerous or is abandoned. Often these reports are accompanied by photos of the property to help illustrate why the property is abandoned, unsafe or dangerous.
- 2. Governing Body passes a Resolution that fixes a time and place at which the owner, the owner's agent, any lienholders of record and any occupant of such structure may appear and show cause why such structure should not be condemned and ordered repaired or demolished in the case of unsafe or dangerous structures or rehabilitated in the case of abandoned property.
- 3. Resolution is published once each week for two consecutive weeks on the same day of each week.

- 4. The matter is set for hearing before the Governing Body at least thirty days after the date of the last publication.
- 5. A copy of the Resolution is mailed by certified mail within three days after its first publication to each such owner, agent, lienholder and occupant at the last known address with the letter marked as "deliver to addressee only."
- 6. At the date set for the hearing the Governing Body hears all evidence submitted by the owner, the owner's agent, lienholders of record and occupants having an interest in the structure as well as evidence submitted by the enforcing officer filing the statement.
- 7. Governing Body makes findings. If the Governing Body finds that the structure is unsafe or dangerous such resolution shall direct the structure to be repaired or removed and the premises made safe and secure. If the Governing Body finds that the property is abandoned, the governing body may authorize the rehabilitation of the property as provided by K.S.A. 12 1756a.
- 8. Resolution containing findings is published once in the official city paper and a copy mailed to the owners, agents, lienholders of record and occupants in the same manner provided for the notice of hearing, i.e., certified mail within three days of the publication of the Resolution to last known address marked as "deliver to addressee only."
- 9. Resolution should fix a reasonable time within which the repair or removal of the structure shall be commenced and a statement the if the owner of such structure fails to commence the repair or removal of such structure within the time stated or fails to diligently prosecute the same until the work is completed, the governing body will cause the structure to be repaired or razed and removed in the case of unsafe or dangerous structures or rehabilitated in the case of abandoned property.
- 10. If the owner fails to commence the repair or removal of the structure within the time stated in the resolution or has failed to diligently prosecute the same thereafter, the city may proceed to raze and remove such structure, make the premises safe and secure, or let the same to contract. The City shall keep an account of the cost of such work and may sell the salvage from such structure and apply the proceeds or any necessary portion thereof to pay the costs of removing such structure and making the premises safe and secure. Any money is excess of the costs shall be paid to the owner of the premises upon which the structure was located.
- 11. The City shall give notice to the owner of the structure by restricted mail of the total costs incurred by the city in removing the structure and making the premises safe and secure and providing notice. The notice shall state that payment of such cost is due and payable within 30 days following receipt of such notice. If the cost is not paid with the thirty-day period and if there is not salvageable material or if money received from the sale, the balance shall be collected in the manner provided by K.S.A. 12-1,115 or assessed as a special assessment against the lot or parcel. See 12-1755 for procedure.

**COUNCIL ACTION NEEDED**: Review, discuss and make a determination of findings on each proposed condemnation resolution.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION TO COUNCIL: Move to authorize consideration of resolutions for each property at the March 12 Council Meeting.

A building permit was issued in March of 2018.

In March of 2018, Building Official Ted Bartlett wrote a letter to the owner of the property in regards to issues with this house, specifically the foundation, and sagging and or broken floor joists. At that time Bartlett was concerned enough to not climb the stairs to the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor, during inspections since the house has racked and rolled causing unknown instability in the structure.

The foundation is crumbling rock, the joists are barely touching the rim joists leaving little or no support.

Part of the floor joist system appears to be sitting on dirt, or have rotted away leaving no support. There are no pier supports under the load bearing walls allowing sag.

I wrote a letter to the owner reiterating my concerns, and required a structural engineer stamp on any plans to effect the repairs of this house to ensure the house is structurally sound.

In June of 2019 I had the city electric crew disconnect the electric wires from the utility pole due to the house moving, pulling the wire tight enough to cause concern that the house may fall and pull on the



AGENDA ITEM: Ordinance No. 3781 – Storage of Solid Waste and Recyclable Materials

**PRESENTER:** Ed Beaudry

**ISSUE SUMMARY:** City Staff have received many complaints regarding trash containers being left on the berm after pick-up. Current City Code does not dictate any regulation on timeframes for trash containers to be left on the berm, or regulation on where containers are to be stored when not set out for pick-up.

Approximately 40 percent of trash is picked up on the street. If that 40 percent continue to leave trash containers on the berm, city staff will continue to receive complaints about trash and the unsightliness of the containers being left on the berm. Containers that are left on the berm blow over in high wind and become obstructions in the road.

Ordinance No. 3781 introduces guidelines for the proper storage of trash and trash containers, including a timeline for leaving containers on the berm after pick-up.

COUNCIL ACTION NEEDED: Review, discuss, and determine whether to approve Ordinance No. 3781.

**STAFF RECOMMENDATION TO COUNCIL:** City staff would like to amend the city code to state that trash containers must be returned to approved storage zones after pick-up service has been completed.

#### **ORDINANCE NO. 3781**

AN ORDINANCE ADDING SECTION 15-506 REGARDING STORAGE OF SOLID WASTE AND RECYCLABLE MATERIALS

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF OSAWATOMIE KANSAS:

SECTION ONE: Section 15-506 of the City Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

#### Section 15-506. – Storage of Solid Waste and Recyclable Materials.

The following requirements shall be complied with in the storage and collection of solid wastes and recyclable materials:

1. The occupant of every dwelling unit and of every institutional, commercial, industrial, agricultural or business establishment, from which solid waste and/or recyclable materials collection is made under this article, shall place and keep all solid waste and/or recyclable materials in City approved containers. Whenever any solid waste and/or recyclable material is subject to decay or putrefaction, blowing or spillage by weather or animals, such waste or material must be kept covered or in City approved containers, closed bins or containers not subject to deterioration. For single family dwellings and duplexes, containers shall be stored prior to pick up outdoors in the following locations:

2.

- a. Behind the dwelling in the rear yard; or
- b. On the side or front yard behind the front building line of the dwelling.
- 3. Residential solid waste shall be stored in approved containers of not more than 96 gallons. Trash containers shall be of lightweight and sturdy construction. Containers, when such are recognized by the City as approved containers for residential solid waste, shall not be placed at the curb, alley or other collection point any earlier than 5pm on the day prior to collection, and must be returned to appropriate storage locations any earlier than 11am the day after collection.

SECTION TWO: This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval, and publication in the Official City newspaper.

#### **Article 5. Solid Waste**

#### 15-501. Definitions.

Unless the context clearly indicates otherwise, the meaning of words and terms as used in this article shall be as follows:

- (a) <u>Commercial Waste</u>. All refuse emanating from establishments engaged in business including, but not limited to stores, markets, office buildings, restaurants, shopping centers, theaters, hospitals, governments and nursing homes.
- (b) <u>Dwelling Unit</u>. Any enclosure, building or portion thereof occupied by one or more persons for and as living quarters;
- (c) <u>Garbage</u>. Waste resulting from the handling, processing, storage, packaging, preparation, sale, cooking and serving of meat, produce and other foods and shall include unclean containers;
  - (d) Multi-Family Unit. Any structure containing more than four individual dwelling units;
  - (e) Refuse. All garbage and/or rubbish or trash;
- (f) <u>Residential</u>. Any structure containing four or less individual dwelling units, rooming houses having no more than four persons in addition to the family of the owner or operator, and mobile homes;
- (g) <u>Rubbish or Trash</u>. All nonputrescible materials such as paper, tin cans, bottles, glass, crockery, rags, ashes, lawn and tree trimmings, stumps, boxes, wood, street sweepings and mineral refuse. Rubbish or trash shall not include earth and waste from building operations or wastes from industrial processes or manufacturing operations;
- (h) <u>Single Dwelling Unit</u>. An enclosure, building or portion thereof occupied by one family as living quarters.
  - (i) Solid Waste. All non-liquid garbage, rubbish or trash.

(Code 2008)

#### 15-502. Collection.

All solid waste accumulated within the city shall be collected, conveyed and disposed of by the city or by contractors specifically authorized to collect and dispose of solid waste.

(Code 2008)

#### **15-503.** Contracts.

The city shall have the right to enter into a contract with any responsible person for collection and disposal of solid waste.

(Code 2008)

#### 15-504. Duty of owner, occupant.

- (a) It shall be the duty of every person occupying or having control of the occupancy of any premises in the City of Osawatomie to notify the offices of the City Clerk of Osawatomie at the beginning of such occupancy, or upon activating any City-provided utility service at such address, on or before December 31, 2018, and request, accept and use the solid waste pickup and collection service operated or contracted by the City of Osawatomie; provided, however, the failure of any owner, rental agent or occupant of such premises to make such request shall not prevent nor in any way impair or impede the City from adding the address of such premises to the proper service and otherwise enforcing by appropriate action the regulatory measures herein prescribed and causing the fees or charges therefor to be paid.
- (b) The owner or occupant of every dwelling unit or commercial enterprise shall provide at his or her own expense a suitable container for the storage of solid waste as provided in this article. No owner or occupant shall permit to accumulate quantities of refuse or other waste materials within or close to any structure within the city unless the same is stored in approved containers and in such a manner as not to create a health or fire hazard.

(Code 2008; Ord. 3770)

#### 15-505. Containers.

All containers, receptacles or bags shall be in compliance with the regulations established by the city or their contractor.

(Code 2008; Code 2018)

#### **15-506.** Reserved.

(Code 2008; Code 2018)

#### 15-507. Enter private premises.

Solid waste collectors, employed by the city or operating under contract with the city, are hereby authorized to enter in and upon private property for the purpose of collecting solid waste therefrom as required by this article.

(Code 2008)

#### 15-508. Ownership of solid waste.

Ownership of solid waste when placed in containers by the occupants or owners of premises upon which refuse accumulates, shall be vested in the city and thereafter shall be subject to the exclusive control of the city, its employees or contractors. No person shall meddle with refuse containers or in any way pilfer or scatter contents thereof in any alley or street within the city.

(Code 2008)

#### 15-509. Reserved.

(Code 2008; Code 2018)

#### 15-510. Bulky item pickup program.

The Bulky Item Pickup Program is for disposal of large household items that can't be handled as part of the weekly trash pickup.

#### (a) Definitions.

- (1) <u>Construction material/debris</u> means discarded building materials and rubble including but not limited to earth, cement, brick, wire, cans, flooring material, lumber, plaster, roofing materials and any other waste resulting from construction, remodeling, repair or demolition of any structure or pavement.
- (2) Bulky items means furniture, toilets, brush in small bundles, paint that is dried, sinks, etc.
- (3) <u>Appliances</u> means refrigerators, freezers, stoves, dishwashers, washing machines, dryers, water heaters, furnaces, air conditioning units, or trash compactors.

#### (b) Rules and Procedures

- (1) Bulky items shall be placed in the manner, and at the time and the location proscribed by the city, or their contractor, per regulations provided on the city and contractor's website. Any bulky item shall not be placed for pickup more than 72 hours before the scheduled pickup.
- (2) Collection shall be provided for all residential refuse customers.
- (3) Appliances and tires shall only be picked up at special times of the year. Tires are limited to six per billed customer.
- (4) Not acceptable are:
  - (A) bags or boxes of smaller items that could be picked up on the regular collection day.
  - (B) loose or scattered materials
  - (C) construction material/debris
  - (D) liquid waste or hazardous materials
- (5) Any items not picked up shall be the responsibility of the customer to remove from street view and out of the front yard or public right of way within 24 hours following the day of pickup.

(Ord. 3606, Sec. 1; Code 2008; Code 2018)

#### 15-511. Hazardous materials.

No person shall deposit in a solid waste container or otherwise offer for collection any hazardous garbage, refuse, or waste. Hazardous material shall include:

- (a) Explosive materials;
- (b) Rags or other waste soaked in volatile and flammable materials;
- (c) Chemicals;
- (d) Poisons;

- (e) Radio-active materials;
- (f) Highly combustible materials;
- (g) Soiled dressings, clothing, bedding and/or other wastes, contaminated by infection or contagious disease;
- (h) Any other materials which may present a special hazard to collection or disposal personnel, equipment, or to the public.

(Code 2008)

#### 15-512. Prohibited practices.

It shall be unlawful for any person to:

- (a) Deposit solid waste in any container other than that owned or leased by him or under his control without written consent of the owner and/or with the intent of avoiding payment of the refuse service charge;
- (b) Interfere in any manner with employees of the city or its contractors in the collection of solid waste;
- (c) Burn solid waste except in an approved incinerator and unless a variance has been granted and a written permit obtained from the city or the appropriate air pollution control agency;
  - (d) Bury refuse at any place within the city except that lawn and garden trimmings may be composted. (Code 2008)

#### 15-513. Objectionable waste.

Manure from cow lots, stables, poultry yards, pigeon lofts and other animal or fowl pens, and waste oils from garages or filling stations shall be removed and disposed of at the expense of the person controlling the same and in a manner consistent with this article.

(Code 2008)

#### 15-514. Unauthorized disposal.

No person shall haul or cause to be hauled any garbage, refuse or other waste material of any kind to any place, site or area within or without the limits of the city unless such site is a sanitary landfill, transfer point or disposal facility approved by the Kansas State Department of Health and Environment.

(Code 2008)

#### 15-515. Closed vehicle.

Any vehicle used by any person for the collection and transportation of solid waste shall be maintained in a good mechanical condition. Vehicle shall be equipped with an enclosed covered body to prevent the contents leaking or escaping therefrom. Only tree trimmings or brush may be transported in open-bodied vehicles provided the material is securely tied in place to prevent scattering along the streets and alleys.

(Code 2008)

#### 15-516. Rules and regulations.

The collection and transportation of trash and waste materials shall be at all times under the general supervision of the city manager or his or her duly authorized agent, who shall have the authority by and with the consent of the governing body to make additional rules and regulations not inconsistent with the terms and provisions of this article requiring that the collection and transportation of trash and waste materials shall be conducted in such manner as not to endanger the public health, or to become an annoyance to the inhabitants of the city, and providing for a proper fee to be charged to the customer.

(Code 2008)

#### 15-517. Fees.

The charges to be assessed and paid by the customer for collection, hauling and disposal of refuse and garbage shall be established annually by resolution of the governing body.

(Code 2008)

#### 15-518. Billing.

Solid waste charges shall be billed as determined by the governing body and the city's contractor and may be included on the city's utility bills. If billed through the city's utility bill, delinquent solid waste bills shall carry the due dates, grace periods and penalties as utility bills.

(Code 2008; Code 2018)

#### 15-519. Penalty.

It shall be unlawful for any person to violate any provision of this article or to refuse or fail to perform any duty imposed by this article, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined \$25.00 per day for the first offense, \$50.00 per day for the second offense, \$75.00 per day for the third offense, and \$100.00 per day for the fourth offense, and every offense thereafter.

**PRESENTER:** Fire Chief Brian Love

**ISSUE SUMMARY:** The Osawatomie Fire Department is building out the fire station for a training room, and office space. 

Treatment Truck out of the CIP – Sewer Fund. In the CIP-General Fund there is an additional \$20,000 for general vehicles that we would request that we use \$1,265.00 of to offset the shortage.
