A new water plant will begin design and preliminary development, and the water distribution system is preparing for major replacements. This spring, a large-scale mural will be finished downtown and hopefully two more will follow this summer. A locally-made interactive art piece will also be headed to the downtown district in honor of our national distinction as "Mile Zero" of the Flint Hills Trail, which is now a Kansas State Park.

We've restarted the Tourism Committee and have plans to jumpstart other City boards and commissions so more people in the community can get involved and help shape our hometown from the inside out. ROAD WORK AHEAD

The City of Osawatomie's "Paving the Way" program is kicking into high gear this year with the first ground breaking in the highly-anticipated street repair and replacement project.

The following table of tasks is the work plan for the first street slated for 2022 repair: Brown Avenue from 16th to 18th. City staff is working hard to make the standard timeline shorter, and is simultaneously beginning the survey and design work for the other streets slated for 2022 work (Main Street Terrace from 18th Street to 16th Street, Walnut Avenue from 6th Street to 4th Street, 18th Street from Main Street to Brown Avenue). Staff continues to work on the designs for the streets in line for 2023 replacement, including the entire stretch of 6th Street from city limits to city limits and Brown Avenue from 7th to 12th.

UTILITY and INFRASTRUCTURE

As part of the "List of 55" projects slated for 2022, several big-ticket items are utility and hard infrastructure goals. In addition to the street repair projects we're beginning this spring and summer, City staff is also working on:

- Wastewater Plant Repairs/Replacement of Equipment
- Water Plant Replacement and Funding (Design)
- Sewer Line Rehabilitation (Design)
- Sidewalk Repair and Replacement
- Completing GIS for Utilities, Streets, and Sidewalks
- Electrical/Cable Utility Relocations (Multi-Year Plan)
- Memorial Hall Structural Repairs
- Solar Array Development and Construction
- Ongoing Electric Conversion

Believe it or not, but this list isn't everything. There are several other utility and infrastructure projects, of varying sizes, on the horizon for our community but these are considered the most critical and have top priority.

Many of these projects require multiple phases and a lot of connecting support and resources. We're lucky to have so many committed community partners, long-standing professional relationships, and dedicated staff members all working to make Osawatomie a greater place to live, work, and play.

NEW CONTRACTS - GREATER SERVICE

The City of Osawatomie, in an effort to increase efficiency and sustainability, has entered into two large service and management contracts with local professionals. These contracts are both a cost-saving measure for residents of Osawatomie, and a timesaving initiative for City staffers who are looking to engage in larger-scale projects and activities in the short- and long-term.

Osawatomie-based landscaping franchise The Grounds Guys, lead by local businessman Chris Troxel, was awarded a roughly \$160,000 annual mowing contract in mid-January and immediately assumed control of lawn and turf maintenance for all City-owned properties, excluding the Osawatomie Golf Course, the levees, and nuisance mowing. This five year contract has a firstyear savings of roughly \$130,000 when compared to previous budget allotments for City mowing and maintenance crews. The Grounds Guys will also be responsible for the turf maintenance at all municipal cemeteries, including mowing and weed-eating.

In addition to a new mowing contract, the City has entered into contract with local couple Emily and Loren McCrea, of Eddy-Birchard Funeral Home, to act as managers for all three municipally owned cemeteries (Oakwood, Elmdale, and Osawatomie Cemetery). Emily is a licensed funeral director and her husband, Loren, is both a funeral attendant at Eddy-Birchard and a Volunteer member of the Osawatomie Fire Department. As managers of Osawatomie cemeteries, the McCreas will handle permits, sale of burial spaces, stone settings, and other daily operations. The City maintains ownership over the cemeteries and will continue to process all payments and billing, and will continue to issue deeds as required by Kansas State Statute.

The cemetery management contract ensures greater efficiency in the daily operation of our municipal cemeteries and provides a route to sustainable record keeping and digitization of historical records.

These changes in operation are useful tools to increase our staff's ability to manage and engage in other, more critical projects such as street repair and economic development activities. For these reasons and more, we are thrilled to partner with such dedicated, local professionals.

OSAWATOMIE AND EVERGY ANNOUNCE SOLAR PROJECT

The City of Osawatomie is excited to announce a partnership with Evergy to explore building up to three (3) megawatts of solar to power our community. The location of the proposed solar array is in the Northland property, just north of the Osawatomie State Hospital campus. The Northland properties were given to the City by the State of Kansas as part of an economic development agreement and the City has been eagerly searching for the perfect industrial or manufacturing development.



From Evergy's release: "Osawatomie's strong leadership shows their investment to continued growth in renewable energy and commitment to our partnership," said Lloyd Jackson, managing director, Evergy Energy Partners. "Our Evergy team is proud to partner with Osawatomie as they expand their energy sources that will continue to serve the community."

Deputy City Manager Bret Glendening said, "We are very excited to work with Evergy and KMEA on this solar project, and they have been great partners to work with in the development process. This project is a great opportunity to diversify our municipal electric utilities' generation portfolio even further, and one of the best parts is that it's within the city limits of Osawatomie."


The City of Osawatomie and Evergy will conduct a viability study before proceeding to building the solar array and entering into a power purchase agreement (PPA) for the energy. Evergy Energy Partners would construct, own and maintain the solar facility, but the City would retain the right to purchase it after seven years and add the facility to our portfolio of generation assets.

More information on the proposed solar array will be made available as the project develops.

What are you most looking forward to working on during your term?



City Council meets regularly on the second and fourth Thursday of the month at Memorial Hall. Meetings start at 6:30pm and the public is invited to speak during the Public Comment period at the start of every meeting. Copies of the agenda and packet materials can be found on the City website, or residents are welcome to stop by City Hall or the Public Library and ask for a paper copy. Sometimes City Council will request a Special Meeting date for unusual or irregular business. In those instances, the meeting notice is posted on the City website detailing the nature and location of the meeting.
