REMINDER: ROAD WORK AHEAD

The City of Osawatomie's "Paving the Way" program is kicking into high gear this year with the first ground breaking in the highly-anticipated street repair and replacement project.

At the April 14th, 2022, regular meeting of City Council, the Governing Body awarded the construction contract for Brown Avenue from 16th Street to 18th Street to low-bidder Killough Construction for \$730,396.00. Killough Construction is based out of Ottawa, Kansas and roadwork starts this summer on the full removal and asphalt replacement.

The following table of tasks is the work plan for the remainder of tasks related to Brown Avenue's repair plan. City staff is simultaneously continuing design work for the other streets slated for 2022 repair or replacement (Main Street Terrace from 18th Street to 16th Street, Walnut Avenue from 6th Street to 4th Street, 18th Street from Main Street to Brown Avenue). Staff also continues to work on the designs for the streets in line for 2023 replacement, including the entire stretch of 6th Street from Lincoln to Kelly and Brown Avenue from 7th to 12th.

Plan your alternate routes now! It's going to be a crazy summer of cones, barricades, and incredible progress.

PUBLIC ART LANDS DOWNTOWN

The City of Osawatomie is bringing public art to the downtown corridor just in time for a beautiful summer season!

As part of a Sunflower Foundation grant aimed at marketing recreational trails, a large-scale interactive display was installed at the corner of 5th and Main. This powder-coated steel tube display, fabricated by Doherty Steel, is both a piece of art and a functional bike rack that welcomes people to our community and gives cyclists a landing pad when they visit the downtown corridor. A decal-covered steel plate will stand in place of the "i" and encourage people to "Stand, Snap, and Share" that "#IAmAtMileZero" for the Flint Hills Trail! The full length of the Flint Hills Trail is now a Kansas State Park and Osawatomie is the proud eastern gateway.

Next up? Connecting to the Katy Trail in Missouri!



Another piece of unique art in our downtown corridor is the amazing (and HUGE) custom mural on the eastern face of the Masonic Temple at 500 Main Street. The mural was funded by an all-inclusive grant from the Kansas Department of Commerce's Office of Rural Prosperity. A Mural Committee made up of community stakeholders selected a muralist out of the over 20 applicants and the winning team worked with the committee on design tweaks and other details before implementation begins this spring. The artists, Brickmob Art Collective, are based out of Wichita and were the perfect fit for our first mural. If the weather holds out, color should hit the bricks sometime around May 13th, 2022.

More murals are scheduled to pop-up in the community this summer thanks to a grant from the Hawkins Foundation.

DOWNTOWN DEVELOPMENT CORP

Over the last six months, a group of committed individuals including Blake Heid (First Option Bank), Janet McRae (Miami County Economic Development), Kari Bradley (Osawatomie Chamber of Commerce / City of Osawatomie), Teri Auten (Rockwall Properties, LLC), Gordon Schrader (Greater Osawatomie, Inc), Dr. Sarah Dorsett, and Mike Scanlon (City of Osawatomie) have establishing working on the Osawatomie Downtown Community Development Corporation (ODCDC).

The purpose of ODCDC is to provide an entity that could apply for large-scale grants and work with private individuals who want to invest in and grow downtown businesses. The original work of ODCDC is aimed at the downtown core but, in time, could be widened to include all business districts across the City.

According to Scanlon, "We are at the very beginning of organizing and putting a framework in place for helping to create successful and enduring businesses in our community. We as a City can't do this work on our own and will be leveraging the investments of private individuals to help both secure grants and attract even more businesses into our community." As the ODCDC forms, the City will be supporting a set of websites that will keep the public informed about the group's projects, goals, and progress.

SPOTLIGHT | City of Osawatomie Water Production and Treatment Team

The City of Osawatomie Water Plant is full of dedicated, educated, and energetic crewmembers. The Water Production and Treatment Team is led by Water Production Superintendent Andrew Burkhart



What are the most significant improvements or changes your team has implemented in the last year?

Burkhart: In the last year, we brought the plant into compliance with KDHE rules and regulations. We self identified eight (8) deficiencies, sent letters to the state, and corrected them. We then passed KDHE inspection with no major deficiencies.

How many team members do you have currently? What sort of certifications or education is recommended for new employees to the plant?

We currently have three full-time operators, one part-time operator, and a maintenance professional. All four operators hold Small Systems Water Operator licenses. Three of them earned these accreditations in April of this year. One operator also has a Small Systems Wastewater license. A Class III license is required for the operator directly responsible for the plant operation, and both the Director of Utilities and I hold Class IVs licenses.

What little-known-fact about water production and treatment do you wish was more widely known by the public?

TextMyGov

The age and condition of the City Water Plant (which is old and in terrible shape) and how hard we work to make clean, drinkable water with it. I'm very, very proud of our team and the work we do. We're all looking forward to continuing to work with the Deputy City Manager and Director of Utilities on the City Council's decision to design and construct a new water plant.

How can residents contact you with questions or concerns regarding our water supply?
