Memorial Hall Facelift

Beginning on September 12th, 2022, Memorial Hall (411 11th Street) will be under construction and a new roof will be installed. New reservations in the facility will be paused until the roof replacement is complete and the site reopened to the general public. People with existing reservations through the month of September have already been contacted and shouldn't be impacted by the work being performed. Funding for this critical project was provided by the Hawkins Foundation.

- 12th Street from Pacific to South Street
- 7th Street from the Overpass to Main Street
- Slayman Heights
- 11th Street from Main Street to (approximately) the Ozone/Aquatics Center


The contract for this mill and overlay phase of the 2022 Paving the Way plan was awarded to McAnany Construction in the amount of \$217,988.75.
